From the Rector

STEWARDSHIP: IT STARTS WITH CHILDREN

JESUS SAID, "Let the little children come unto me, and do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs. Truly I say to you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God as a little child will never enter it" (*Luke 18:16-17*).

This scripture certainly makes it clear that children are important to Jesus. And if nothing else, it calls us, as adults who lead and serve in our parish, to consider children in our church discussions and planning, particularly around stewardship, which affects all aspects of our lives.



I think this verse also tells us that adults can learn a lot from children. Luke 18 continues by telling the story of the man who asks Jesus what he must do to inherit eternal life. When Jesus tells him to sell all his possessions and distribute the money to the poor, the man hangs his head in sadness, unable to fulfill Jesus' call. Yet how often do we witness children eagerly sharing all that is in their pockets or their piggy bank to help a friend or a cause they care about.

Generosity lives in children's hearts. As adults, it is our role to empower children to discover, nurture, celebrate and share this God-given generosity. This is beyond simply including children in common stewardship practices, but it is about modifying the practices so that children can experience the transformation that comes from a deepened relationship with God.

Here are three potential steps that can enable children to live out their roles as God's stewards:

THE OFFERING

Make sure children and youth have a method for giving an offering every week. Perhaps provide your child with a fresh envelope each week. Or, maybe your child could join you when you give on-line. This shows kids that they are an important part of our parish community.

IDENTIFIED BUDGET

Make sure the offerings of children are acknowledged. Children need to be able to see how their dollar bills grow into significant amounts when given in community with others.

KIDS VESTRY OR A CHURCH SCHOOL COUNCIL

Children need a decision-making forum to provide a process for determining the use of their funds. All children may participate. The most

important aspect of these forums is that the children are allowed to make autonomous decisions that are not directed by adults.

These steps also lay the foundation for exploring the holistic nature of God's gifts in Church and at home. Be sure to let the children share what they learn from their stewardship practices with the congregation at large. We grown-ups can learn a lot from "the little children."

CALLED TO SERVICE: VESTRY

VESTRY NOMINATIONS

The Vestry Nominating Committee will soon be seeking nominations for the Vestry. New members will be chosen at our annual meeting in January. We need your help in choosing them. Here's what you need to know.

WHAT DOES THE VESTRY DO?

It's the legal governing body of the parish, the "board of directors." With the rector as its leader, it sets policy and goals and oversees the finances and property. But it has another equally important role: providing leadership to implement the ministries that serve the parish and the community. It actively supports the work and ministry of the Rector.

WHO CAN RUN FOR VESTRY?

Any baptized member of the Episcopal Church who has been a member of our parish in good standing for at least one year, is at least 16 years old, makes a regular financial contribution to the parish, and worships regularly with us.

IS THERE AN EXPECTED TIME COMMITMENT?

Yes. A term runs for three years. The Vestry meets once every month. Vestry members are also members of either the Property Committee or Finance Committee. We have one all-day Vestry Retreat once a year. And since every vestry member's voice matters, our goal is for members to have no more than three unexcused absences from regular meetings in a year.



WHAT DO WE LOOK FOR IN A VESTRY MEMBER?

Someone who is involved in some parish ministry, and preferably (but not necessarily) has shown some leadership ability. He or she should keep informed about the parish and be willing to contribute to working out solutions to issues that arise. Every Vestry member should work respectfully with other members and participate in discerning the parish's vision and encouraging its ministries. The Vestry affords people the opportunity to share a variety of their own gifts and talents.

HOW ARE VESTRY MEMBERS CHOSEN?

They are nominated by the Nominating Committee, whose recommendation must be approved by the Vestry, and they are elected at the annual meeting.

HOW DOES THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE WORK?

It accepts suggestions from parishioners, discusses possible candidates, decides who it thinks should be nominated, makes sure people are willing to run, and presents a proposed slate to the Vestry. The approved nominees are then

announced to the parish. Each nominee will then be asked to prepare a statement of qualifications of no more than 100 words.

HOW CAN I NOMINATE SOMEONE?

You may complete and give this form to Fr. Ron or a member of the Nominating Committee, or put it in the collection basket, or leave it with Mark Trautman in the Parish Office. You may nominate yourself or someone else.

CHRISTMAS GIFT COLLECTION & DISTRIBUTION

Once again, St. John's will be collecting and distributing Christmas presents for anyone between the ages of birth to 18 years old. Christmas presents will be distributed to various agencies, including The Somerset Home for Temporarily Displaced Children, Agape House, Somerset County Jail Chaplaincy program (children of inmates), and many other children we are aware of in the community. The firm deadline will be on Saturday, December 11 by 9 am *sharp!*

Here's the plan: people purchase a toy (or toys) to be given to someone in need. If Christmas presents are wrapped, they must be clearly marked for boy or



girl and indicate what age. Or if the toy(s) is unwrapped then holiday gift bags or wrapping paper must be to be provided. Deliver gift to the church no later than Saturday, December 11 at 9 am. You may bring your gift(s) to church on any Sunday morning and place it in a large box which will be in the Narthex. Or you may contact the Parish Office to determine a mutually convenient time

when you can to drop them off. You decide what sex and age you desire to purchase a gift for! This year, may we suggest gift cards, as they may prove to be easier to distribute.

This year, only 10 volunteers are needed (because of the pandemic) to help us welcome families and individuals when they arrive at St. John's, conduct contact tracing for every person, help assemble food baskets, toys and gifts, bag and distribute Christmas gifts to agencies and families. From 9 am until 11 am volunteers will organize gifts and food baskets downstairs.

From 11 am until 1 pm, volunteers will greet people in the back parking lot, where they will safely accompany them to the basement area observing safety guidelines and protocols. Once downstairs more volunteers will assist those who seek gifts and assist by putting the toys and gifts into bags or boxes. Then they will be escorted out of the building using another exit.

We will need volunteers to transport toys and gifts to local agencies and homes using their own cars. If interested in volunteering, contact Fr. Ron, frronpollock1@verizon.net. With your help we can provide some hope for those in need.

SACRED GROUND: A FILM-BASED DIALOGUE SERIES ON RACE & FAITH

Sacred Ground is a film- and readings-based dialogue series on race, grounded in faith. Small groups are invited to walk through chapters of the United States' history of race and racism, while weaving in threads of family story, economic class, and political and regional identity.

The 10-part series is built around a powerful online curriculum of documentary films and readings that focus on Indigenous, Black, Latino, and Asian/Pacific American histories as they intersect with European American histories.

Sacred Ground is part of Becoming Beloved Community, The Episcopal Church's long-term commitment to racial healing, reconciliation, and justice in our personal lives, our ministries, and our society. This series is open to all, and especially designed to help white people talk with other white people. Participants are invited to peel away the layers that have contributed to the challenges and divides of the present day—all while grounded in our call to faith, hope, and love.

St. John's is 'Looped'!

The NJ Association of the Hearing Loss Association of America (HLAA) has just updated its listing of looped facilities in New Jersey. Sadly, St John's remains the only Episcopal Church on the list. On Sunday October 10, HLAA-NJ distributed a list of churches several hundred HHD (hard of hearing or deaf) people, and their supporters, at NJ's annual March for Hearing, in Mercer County Park. Later this fall, the list will be distributed to legislators as they consider two NJ bills requiring public spaces (city halls, etc.) to provide loops under certain circumstances.

We are proud to be looped for the hard of hearing or deaf. Many thanks to Catherine O'Shea and the late Lt. Col. Bob Vaucher for their efforts in making this new ministry a possibility at St. John's!
