Maundy Thursday

Tonight we enter the *Triduum*, the three-days' space starting with Maundy Thursday and ending at the Great Vigil of Easter on Holy Saturday evening. In these three days we recall Christ's suffering, death, and resurrection. Through Christ we are saved and made free.

The traditional English name for today, "Maundy," comes from the Latin word *mandatum* which means "commandment." There are two traditional associations on this day: the institution of the Holy Eucharist and the command of our Lord to wash each others' feet—the "mandatum" (John 13:4-5; we will not observe this ceremony this evening). The footwashing ceremony is an ancient practice of the church meant to remind us of our duty to love and serve one another and the world. Jesus taught that strength and growth in the life of the Kingdom of God comes not by power, authority, or even miracles, but by such lowly service.

After the communion, the altar is stripped of all cloths and ornaments, and the clergy of stoles just as Christ was stripped of his garments. The Eucharist will not be celebrated again until the Great Vigil of Easter on Saturday night.

The service has no dismissal; rather, the church continues to watch and pray throughout the *Triduum*.

THE LESSONS

FIRST LESSON *Exodus 12:1-14*

Reader

A reading from the Book of Exodus. The LORD said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each household. If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbor in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who eat of it. Your lamb shall be without blemish, a year-old male; you may take it from the sheep or from the goats. You shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month; then the whole assembled congregation of Israel shall slaughter it at twilight. They shall take some of the blood and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses in which they eat it. They shall eat the lamb that same night; they shall eat it roasted over the fire with unleavened bread and bitter herbs. Do not eat any of it

raw or boiled in water, but roasted over the fire, with its head, legs, and inner organs. You shall let none of it remain until the morning; anything that remains until the morning you shall burn. This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the passover of the LORD. For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both human beings and animals; on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the LORD. The blood shall be a sign for you on the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt. This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the LORD; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance.

Do this in remembrance of me." In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.
Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand." Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only

but also my hands and my head!" Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you." For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean." After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord—and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them.... Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, 'Where I am going, you cannot come.' I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

AN ACT OF HUMILITY, REPENTANCE, AND RENEWAL

Dear friends in Christ, the Lord Jesus suffered for us, leaving us an example that we might follow in his steps. In his incarnation he took our human flesh and lived among us for a time. He came not to be served but to serve, and to give up his life for us. Christ died for us, once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, that he might bring us to God, in whose image we have been created.

In Baptism we have died in the flesh and been made alive in the

Spirit. We have been buried with Christ, that we might share in his resurrection.

As we celebrate the mystery of our Lord's death and resurrection, let us come before God in penitence, praying that God's image in us may be restored, and that we may be renewed in the power of the Holy Spirit. I ask you, therefore:

Do you place your faith in God, who created the world, and in whose image you are made?

Will you recognize in others the image of God in which you and they are made?

Celebrant Will you be faithful in worship, in reading holy Scripture, and in prayer?

People We will, by the grace of God's Holy Spirit.

Celebrant Will you use your gifts in the service of Christ's Body, the Church?

STRIPPING THE ALTAR

The choir will chant Psalm 22 after the Stripping of the Altar. The service has no dismissal; rather, the church continues to watch and pray throughout the Triduum.

After the stripping, please leave quietly.

A Vigil will be kept until midnight. All are welcome to stay and keep vigil.
