FROM THE RECTOR

FAMILY TRADITIONS FOR THE SEASON OF ADVENT

Saying Grace Together

If your family doesn't have a tradition of saying grace, now is a great time to start. Pick one meal a day and try to say grace at that meal for each day during Advent. You can read a grace from *The Book of Common Prayer* (look at page 835), use your own words to thank God for your food, or go around the table and each say one

thing that you are grateful for that day. *You can even sing!* The Doxology (*The Hymnal 1982, 380,* stanza 3) is a wonderful grace to sing—it's great fun!

Praying Together

Find a time once a week to pray together as a family. Express your joys and your concerns, and ask God for guidance and blessing. If you haven't taught your children the Lord's Prayer or the 23rd Psalm, the season of Advent is a wonderful time to practice saying those beautiful prayers together. Pray them together as a family before the children go to bed.

Reading Scripture Together

Advent is a time to grow closer to God, to pay more attention to God by simplifying our lives and reminding ourselves of God's great love and mercy towards us. What better way to grow closer to God than reading the Bible? Read a few verses of the Bible together every night. You may wish to follow the lectionary. Or you might pick and choose—something from the Announcement to the Virgin Mary all the way through the Wise Men. See how far you get. If you do have a tradition of reading the Bible together, choose a different translation of the Bible, like Eugene Peterson's *The Message*, so that the stories sound fresh and new.

Proclaim the Gospel in Word and Deed

As a family, find a project that will shine the light of Christ to the world. Here are some suggestions of how to love your neighbor as yourself:

- Count how many pairs of shoes you have and see if you might have an extra pair you could donate to someone in need. Add some socks and underwear for good measure!
- Consider the Adopt-a-family program at St. John's. Bring a bag of food items to church.

- Consider buying a Christmas toy, present or gift card for someone in need.
- Give up eating out once a week and donate the money to the Episcopal Relief & Development Fund.
- Volunteer at an animal shelter. Collect blankets and donate them to a shelter.
- Care for God's creation by starting a compost for your garden next spring.
- Invite a lonely classmate to eat with you at the lunch table at school
- When you are filling out your Christmas cards, send one or more to:
 - -A resident of a local nursing home, residential care facility or a patient in a hospital.
 - − A Recovering American Soldier, c/o Walter Reed, National Military Medical Center.

Advent

Learn about the season of Advent, the Advent Wreath, Colors of Advent, Church Year Calendar, the Feast of St. Nicholas, Prophets, the Annunciation, Gabriel visits Mary, Joseph's Dream, the Peaceable Kingdom, the Visitation, Mary visits her cousin Elizabeth, the journey to Bethlehem, No Room in the Inn, Animals in the Stable, the Shepherds, the Heavenly Host, Silent Night, Christmas, preparing your house, gifts, the Feast of the Epiphany, the Adoration of the Magi, make Advent Cookies & Plum Sugar (see flyer for the recipe in Parish Hall).

Advent Wreath

As a family, make your own special Advent wreath. This is a wonderful custom that will help mark time for the four weeks leading up to Christmas. Use 3 blue and 1 pink candles (or 3 purple and 1 pink candles). Feel free to use the prayers found in the Advent brochure provided at St. John's.

The Good Deeds Jar

Put a jar on the kitchen counter next to a bowl of dried black-eyed peas. During Advent, any family member who performs a good deed, such as folding someone else's laundry or making their bed, moves a pea into the jar. On Christmas, the peas are replaced with candy canes or some other favorite family candy item. Add a few more pieces of candy for good measure! During Christmas everyone is invited to talk about one of the nice things they did for someone else. The tradition reminds us that while you never have control over whether someone else does something nice for you, but you always have control over whether you do something kind for someone else.






PARISH CHOIR NEWS

Gordon's mother was deeply touched by the fact that St. John's has opened up our doors on Monday evenings for 25 years providing a safe and comfortable space for people who are in recovery. Lynne wanted to support our on-going efforts in providing a safe and comfortable space



where people could come together, better educate themselves, connect and receive mutual support and encouragement. And so, with my concurrence she contracted with Ethan Allen, a local furniture store. She consulted with a designer to formally arrange for new furniture to be installed. There are 15 "Brooke" armless chairs, 4 sets of Navina Nesting tables, 2 "Marcus" medium sofas, a Lynton Broadloom rug, and a large screen Samsung TV screen.

The Philadelphia Eleven, December 10 at 2 pm

Fifty years ago in Philadelphia there was a dramatic breakthrough of the so-called stained-glass ceiling that caused a seismic shock wave through the world-wide Anglican Communion and gave hope to Christian women everywhere.



In 1974, a group of 11 women were ordained to the Episcopal priesthood by other bishops of the church using the proper liturgical rites, but in violation of the constitution and canons of the Episcopal Church. This story is told in a compelling new documentary *The Philadelphia Eleven*, which will be screened *December 10 at 2 pm* at St. John's, followed by a communal discussion of the film and its implications for the past, present, and future of the Episcopal Church.

VESTRY NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Annual Parish Meeting: Sunday, January 14, 2024 POSITIONS OPEN INCLUDE:

- One (1) Warden;
- Three (3) Vestry positions for three-year terms;

- One (1) Deputy to Diocesan Convention for a three-year term;

CALLED TO SERVICE: VESTRY

WHAT DOES THE VESTRY DO?

It's the legal governing body of the parish, the "board of directors." With the rector as its leader, it sets policy and goals and oversees the finances and property. But it has another equally important role: providing leadership to implement the ministries that serve the parish and the community. It actively supports the work and ministry of the Rector.

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

WHO CAN RUN FOR VESTRY?

Any baptized member of the Episcopal Church who has been a member of our parish in good standing for at least one year, is at least 16 years old, makes a regular financial contribution to the parish, and worships regularly with us.

IS THERE AN EXPECTED TIME COMMITMENT?

Yes. A term runs for three years. The Vestry meets once every month. Vestry members are also members of either the Property Committee or Finance Committee. We have one all-day Vestry Retreat once a year. And since every vestry member's voice matters our goal is for members to have no more than three unexcused absences from regular meetings in a year.

What do we look for in a Vestry member?

Someone who is involved in some parish ministry, and preferably (but not necessarily) has shown some leadership ability. He or she should keep informed about the parish and be willing to contribute to working out solutions to issues that arise. Every Vestry member should work respectfully with other members and participate in discerning the parish's vision and encouraging its ministries. The Vestry affords people the opportunity to share a variety of their own gifts and talents.

HOW ARE VESTRY MEMBERS CHOSEN?

They are nominated by the Nominating Committee, whose recommendation must be approved by the Vestry, and they are elected at the annual meeting.

HOW DOES THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE WORK?

It accepts suggestions from parishioners, discusses possible candidates, decides who it thinks should be nominated, makes sure people are willing to run, and presents a proposed slate to the Vestry. The approved nominees are then announced to the parish. Each nominee will then be asked to prepare a statement of qualifications of no more than 100 words.

HOW CAN I NOMINATE SOMEONE?

You may complete and give this form to FatherRon or a member of the Nominating Committee, or put it in the collection basket, or leave it with Mark Trautman in the Parish Office. You may nominate yourself or someone else.

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

The Annual Meeting of St. John's Parish will be Sunday, January 14, in the Parish Hall following the 10:15 am Eucharist. Come cast your vote for your Warden, Vestry Members, Diocesan Convention Deputies and Watchung Convocation delegates.

All submissions for the Annual Report are due in the Parish Office by Monday, January 8; email to mtrautman@stjohnsomerville.org.

The Canons of the Church (49:1) wisely require an Annual Meeting of every congregation in which to elect those whose duty it is to protect the church property, and see that all things needed for the orderly worship of God and for the administration of the sacraments and Ordinances of the Church be provided. And further, to see that the funds of the Parish are expended properly (50:2,3). Those elected to the Vestry, and those elected to represent the parish in Diocesan capacities are expected to be faithful in their attendance at worship and to set an example in stewardship.

The Episcopal Church provided for a democratic method of governing itself and the annual elections are proof of that method. It takes seriously the responsibility laid upon people to support, to suggest, to extend the Kingdom of God through the Church. Canon 49:2, 4 defines the qualifications of votes and officers to be elected:

The voters shall be baptized, at least 16 years of age, domiciled in the Parish,
of good moral character, adhering to this Church and to no other religious
body, regular attendants at the services of the Church in said Parish, meaning
thereby those who are more frequently present than absent, and regular
contributors to the current expenses of the Parish in the manner prescribed by
the Vestry.

• The qualified voters shall elect such officers who shall be communicants in good standing. The term "communicant" shall be taken to mean a person who has been confirmed by a Bishop of this Church or by a Bishop of a Church in communion with this Church, or has been received into this Church by a Bishop of this Church, and who shall have received the Holy Communion at least once during the preceding year.

HEADS: Please prepare a written report about the ministry and activities of your group or committee.

TREASURERS: Please prepare your financial report including: receipts—opening balance, receipts, (list categories, not single items), total receipts, balance and total. Disbursements (list categories, not single items), total disbursements, year's closing balance disbursements, and closing balance. Treasurers must include reports of monies in all saving accounts using the same information above.
