Reflections

Today is the first day of Holy Week, the most solemn time of the Church Year. During this period, Christians throughout the world strive to "walk the road that Jesus trod" from his arrival in Jerusalem, his last meal with his friends, his trial, his crucifixion, death, burial, and resurrection. In particular, liturgical focus is centered on the *Triduum* (the three sacred days): Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Great Vigil on Saturday.

Today's liturgy is dramatic in predictable and unpredictable ways. We follow the usual sequence, beginning with a procession into the church with hymns and songs of praise, witnessing publicly to our faith through the ritual commemoration of Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem. The service soon takes a dramatic turn as we switch from praise to condemnation. As we act out the terrible drama of Jesus' abandonment, torture and death, we are cast in a role: We are among those who contribute to his condemnation. And because we are implicated, the drama has the power impact each of us differently, unpredictably, year by year, as our lives are in constant transition. None of us is quite the same person as we were last year, while the sufferings and horrors of the world around us bear new faces.

GOSPEL LESSON

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Mark 11:1-11

Deacon A reading from the Gospel of Mark. When they were approaching Jerusalem, at Bethphage and Bethany, near the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two of his disciples and said to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately as you enter it, you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden; untie it and bring it. If anyone says to you, 'Why are you doing this?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it and will send it back here immediately." They went away and found a colt tied near a door, outside in the street. As they were untying it, some of the bystanders said to them, "What are you doing, untying the colt?" They told them what Jesus had said; and they allowed them to take it. Then they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it; and he sat on it. Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut in the fields. Then those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting, "Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Blessed is the coming kingdom of our ancestor David! Hosanna in the highest heaven!" Then he entered Jerusalem and went into the temple; and when he had looked around at everything, as it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the twelve. Deacon	The Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.
	Please be seated
Evangelist	As soon as it was morning, the chief priests held a consultation with the elders and scribes and the whole council. They bound Jesus, led him away, and handed him over to Pilate. Pilate asked him,
Pilate	Are you the King of the Jews?
Evangelist	Jesus answered him,
Jesus	You say so.
Evangelist	Then the chief priests accused him of many things. Pilate asked him again,
Pilate	Have you no answer? See how many charges they bring against you.
Evangelist	But Jesus made no further reply, so that Pilate was amazed. Now at the festival he used to release a prisoner for them, anyone for whom they asked. Now a man called Barabbas was in prison with the rebels who had committed murder during the insurrection. So the crowd came and began to ask Pilate to do for them according to his custom. Then he answered them,
Pilate	Do you want me to release for you the King of the Jews?
Evangelist	For he realized that it was out of jealousy that the chief priests had handed him over. But the chief priests stirred up the crowd to have him release Barabbas for them instead. Pilate spoke to them again,
Pilate	Then what do you wish me to do with the man you call the King of the Jews?

Evangelist	They shouted back,
Crowd	Crucify him!
Evangelist	Pilate asked them,
Pilate	Why, what evil has he done?
Evangelist	But the shouted all the more,
Crowd	Crucify him!
Evangelist	So Pilate, wishing to satisfy the crowd, released Barabbas for them; and after flogging Jesus, he handed him over to be crucified. Then the soldiers led him into the courtyard of the palace (that is, the governor's headquarters); and they called together the whole cohort. And they clothed him in a purple cloak; and after twisting some thorns into a crown, they put it on him. And they began saluting him,
Soldiers	Hail, King of the Jews!
Evangelist	They struck his head with a reed, spat upon him, and knelt down in homage to him. After mocking him, they stripped him of the purple cloak and put his own clothes on him. Then they led him out to crucify him. They compelled a passer-by, who was coming in from the country, to carry his cross; it was Simone of Cyrene, the father of Alexander and Rufus. Then they brought Jesus to the place called Golgotha (which means the place of a skull). And they offered him wine mixed with myrrh; but he did not take it.
	Please stand
Evangelist	And they crucified him, and divided his clothes among them, casting lots to decide what each should take. It was nine o'clock in the morning when they crucified him. The inscription of the charge against him read, "The King of the Jews." And with him they crucified two bandits, one on his right and one on his left. Those who passed by derided him, shaking their heads and saying,
Crowd	Aha! You who would destroy the temple and build it in three days, save yourself, and come down from the cross!
Evangelist	In the same way the chief priests, along with the scribes, were also mocking him among themselves and saying,
Chief Priests	He saved others; he cannot save himself. Let the Messiah, the King of Israel, come down from the cross now, so that we may see and believe.

Evangelist	Those who were crucified with him also taunted him. When it was noon, darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon. At three o'clock Jesus cried out with a loud voice,
Jesus	Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani?
Evangelist	Which means,
Jesus	My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?
Evangelist	When some of the bystanders heard it, they said,
Crowd	Listen, he is calling for Elijah.
Evangelist	And someone ran, filled a sponge with sour wine, put it on a stock, and gave it to him to drink, saying,
Bystander	Wait, let us see whether Elijah will come to take him down.
Evangelist	Then Jesus gave a loud cry and breathed his last. And the curtain of the temple was torn in two, from top to bottom.
	Silence is kept for a space
	Now when the centurion, who stood facing him, saw that in this way he breathed his last, he said,
Centurion	Truly this man was God's Son!
Evangelist	There were also women looking on from a distance; among them were Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James the younger and of Joseph and Salome. These used to follow him and provided for him when he was in Galilee; and there were many other women who had come up with him to Jerusalem.
	When evening had come, and since it was the day of Preparation, that is, the day before the Sabbath, Joseph of Arimathea, a respected member of the council, who was also himself waiting expectantly for the kingdom of God, went boldly to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus. Then Pilate wondered if he were already dead; and summoning the centurion, he asked him whether he had been dead for some time. When he learned from the centurion that he was dead, he granted the body to Joseph. Then Joseph brought a linen cloth, and taking down the body, wrapped it in the linen cloth, and laid it in a tomb that had been hewn out of the rock. He then rolled a stone against the door of the tomb. Mary Magdalene and Mary the mother of Joseph saw where the body was laid.
