

our big red doors in 1850 for the first time, we announced that we would be "shining lights in the Church and blessings to the world." So we have been. From our earliest years, St. John's has welcomed people from all walks of life who faithfully dedicated themselves in their homes, the workplace, their neighborhoods, their classrooms, the Diocese of New Jersey, and the world volunteering their time, talent and treasure to make the planet a better place.

There's no shortage of challenges in the world. Poverty. Illiteracy. Homelessness. Social justice. Violence. Drugs. Disease. Conflict. Seeking solutions requires creativity, compassion and perhaps most importantly, knowledge grounded in critical thinking and global engagement. Sound familiar? These Christian values, traits and behaviors have been present at St. John's for generations and can be found today in many of our passionate and generous people, in our work and labor, and in our various ministries.

In his book Servant Leadership: A Journey into the Nature of Legitimate Power and Greatness, Robert Greenleaf offered one of the most wonderful definitions of service that I know. Genuine service means "that other people's highest priority needs are being served. The best test, and difficult to administer, is this: Do they, while being served, become healthier, wiser, freer, more autonomous, more likely themselves to become servants? And, what is the effect on the least privileged in society? Will they benefit or at least not be further deprived?" In my experience, the most rewarding ministry in serving others, are ones that create a genuine partnership, a solidarity between helpers and those being helped.

At its core, service, ministry and discipleship asks us all to reflect on the impact of what we do.

The people of St. John's Church have an ongoing opportunity to reflect upon how different members have taken actions that get to the heart of Greenleaf's wise observations. My hope for you is to find inspiration here, and to channel that creative energy and passion in serving Jesus Christ and the world. It's who we are. It's in our DNA. Invite a family member, neighbor or friend. See you in Church or online!

## A Forum on Children's Religious Education and Formation

Intended for parents, teachers and other interested adults Saturday, May 11 at 11 am and Saturday, May 18 at 11 am

Recently I was talking with the parents of two children (from another parish in North Carolina) and they shared that they felt good about raising their kids. One reason why things were going well was because they felt there was a



healthy interchange between them and the church community. "That is perhaps one of the most important ingredients in their formation" they said.

It is important to reflect upon the traditions and rituals children celebrate over the course of their lives. For example, before every baptism I make sure parents and I have an opportunity to go over the baptismal service and for me to provide resources for the parents and the God-parents. We discuss the meaning of baptism as we prepare. A rite of passage, such as baptism, can be a powerful moment in the life of anyone, especially a child or young adult. When certain milestones are recognized and celebrated, children feel embraced and affirmed by the community. Most recently, two young girls received their First Holy Communion on Easter Sunday. It was made especially meaningful because of the preparation and instruction that took place prior to their special day. Our forum will be an opportunity for parents to dream, anticipate and plan ways they can nurture their child's faith as they grow. *Here is our agenda:* 

- Opening prayer for parents and their children, about hope, commitment, life, love and promise.
- We will focus on three things: age and stages, rites of passage (baptism, First Holy Communion, Confirmation) and traditions.

• Question for parents: what do you want your children to know, feel, and do in terms of their faith development and when.

#### Examples:

- *By the first grade,* I want my children to know the Lord's Prayer.
- *By the fifth grade,* I want my children to know the Ten Commandments.
- *By the seventh grade,* I want my children to know the Sacraments of the Church.
- By the twelfth grade, I want my children to know all the Books of the Bible. We will identify key milestones that parents would like to see celebrated. What might their rites of passage look like? What would make it special? How can family, friends, church members, and others become involved?

Finally, how might an awareness of family and church traditions be emphasized? What might preparation look like for parents and children.

My prayer is that parents and other interested folks will have an opportunity to consider the ways they can make children grow deeper in relationship with Jesus Christ and His Church. I look forward to spending a little bit of time with you.

## Rogationtide

In 1559, the Anglican Book of Common Prayer required a particular prayer to be read in all Anglican Churches on the Sunday before Ascension Day, and on the following Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. Some of the more historical among you might know that these days in the Church Year are known as "Rogation Days." In the pre-industrial world, the Church noted with great care the days we should pray for good planting and good harvest, the days we should pray for the earth. This year, Rogation begins Sunday, May 5.



The word "Rogation" comes from the Latin word *rogare* which means "to ask." In the Christian Church, Rogation Days were set aside for special prayer for God's creation and the fruit of the earth. It is a sad pity, a tragedy really, that our industrial and even post-industrial society pays such little attention to that prayer. I pray that we return to those roots, that we return to these days, always just before the Feast of the Ascension (this year on May 9), as Rogation Days. Here is a portion of a particular prayer, the one required by Queen Elizabeth in 1559. Listen to its beauty and truth:

Almighty God, who has blessed the earth that it should be fruitful and bring forth everything that is necessary and has commanded us to work with quietness and eat our own bread; bless us in all our labors and grant us seasonable weather that we may gather in the fruits of the earth and ever rejoice in thy goodness to the praises of thy holy Name, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

God has blessed the earth, that it should be fruitful! In addition to the 1559 requirement mentioned above, the Church required a procession around the Church. The entire Parish was meant to go outside and walk around the Church, in Rogationtide. It's time for us to take another look outside, too, to stop staying inside, cooped up, staring at TV screens and burning energy to stay comfortable, but to walk outside and observe the world. What do we see? Where do we see

God at work in Creation? How can we improve our awareness in the stewardship of God's Creation? Why should the Church be talking about Rogationtide? Quite simply, because the Church is in the business of Salvation. Jesus said, in John 3:16, "For God so loved the world...." That means "the world!" Not just the people in the world. God wants to save not just you and me, but the world itself. Salvation is not meant to be merely personal. It means salvation of others as well. And ultimately, salvation also refers to this very earth itself, to our land and air and water, all that sustains life here. Our ancestors made sure they asked their gracious God for fair and seasonable weather, for good planting and harvest. And so should we!

Last Sunday morning, Father Ron's sermon focused on Jesus' teachings on friendship. It was a very poignant topic for me, as he baptized my new best friend, Ella Marie Alcaraz. Ella is about seven months old, and I feel so blessed to live across the street and play with her. Her parents, Beth and Brian, who bought the house less than two years ago, are also special friends. I love them all, so I was thrilled that they chose St. John's for Ella to begin her spiritual life. That I had something to do with this is proof that Father Ron's sermon was true. You never know what role your friendship can play in others' lives.

Actually, Ella isn't my only new bestie to join St. John's. My other favorite neighbors (yes, you can have several favorites, just like you can have many favorite flavors of ice



cream...coffee, pumpkin, black cherry. *Yes! Yes! Yes!* Eric and Ernie are now knitted into our St. John's family. Ernie and I walk arm-in-arm to and from choir. Eric faithfully serves the Clothes Closet by setting up and removing the big sign. Even Ernie's mom and her husband, Marlene and Cesar, who recently moved from Miami to Somerville also regularly attend church. They are all being weaved into St. John's community.

I believe that friendship comes easily to Episcopalians. Whoever came up with the marketing slogan "the welcoming church" was onto something! When was the last time you wrote a letter to a friend? Father Ron and Deacon Keith write long letters each week. We call them sermons, but if you pay attention (and sitting where I do in the front of the choir, I have to), Father Ron addresses us as "my dear friends." They describe how we can improve our lives through the weekly readings. Although a bit more formal that my friends speak to each other, the sermons are often the kind of advice you get from friends.

I'm so happy that we have a lovely church community where I can bring friends of all faiths and backgrounds. My Jewish friend never misses Lessons and Carols. She and her family also came (along with several of my non-St. John's friends) to celebrate the life of Manuel (Manny) Ovando. That's what friends do—support each other when we lose people we love. Manny was a very important person to me. I met Manny when I joined the choir at St. John's. They

met him at my house many times over the years. It was very sad, but also very meaningful to share our spiritual home when it was time to say goodbye to someone so unique.

Yes, I have plenty of friends outside of St. John's. The girls I broke rules with as a teen (including playing hide-and-go-seek in Trinity Episcopal Church's basement in Elmira, NY), college friends who challenged me intellectually, various colleagues, "mom friends" (usually parents of my children's friends), neighbors from everywhere I've lived, and the list goes on. One of my "mom friends" served as my daughter's confirmation sponsor, when we learned she needed one the evening before!

And, of course, I have many St. John's friends. The Mandraccias (who introduced me to St. John's), new friends "Carolyn and Carolyn," my neighbor, Fr. Ron... the list goes on and on. Living away from most of my family, I've had to build strong friendships. How fortunate to know so many of these friendships are part of St. Johns. Every time I walk into the choir room, I feel loved. According to the sermon, friendships are not just a teaching of Jesus, each one is a gift from God. If I can be such a gift to one person, I'm being a good Christian. Every time you check in with a neighbor, you are, too!

This Sunday I realized that we already have what Jesus wants for each of us: a thriving community of friendship, faith and love. So, welcome to St. John's, Ella, beautiful, sweet, baby girl. As we promised, we will all support you.


