From the Rector

I REMEMBER A BEAUTIFUL WHITE BIRCH TREE in my parents' back yard in Cinnaminson, New Jersey. At the time we planted it I think I was just as tall as the tree was. The years passed, our family life went ahead and I didn't give it much thought. Day and night, year-in, year-out, the tree grew while we worked and played, and laughed and cried. My brother and sister and I grew up and had our pictures taken in the backyard on special occasions: birthdays, confirmations,



graduations, and so forth. And in the summer when we played baseball the tree was located in the perfect position to be "second base." As we had done for years, kids from the neighborhood would come by to play baseball, and drink lemonade by our favorite birch tree.

In many of His parables, Jesus points to natural growth—seeds, plants, crops, shrubs and trees—to illustrate the growth of the reign of God. In the parable of the seed growing secretly (Mark 4:26-29), our Lord teaches that a farmer "knows not how" seeds sprout and grow. "The earth produces of itself," while the farmer works and sleeps, day and night. "But when the grain is rips, at once he goes in with his sickle, because the harvest has come." The growth of the kingdom of God is just as certain as that!

In baptism we are called to work and pray and give for the kingdom of God. But the kingdom is coming, because God is faithful. Martin Luther, who taught and preached and led the Reformation with his relentless energy, could also sit and rest, confident in God's faithfulness. "While I sit and drink my little glass of Wittenberg beer," he once said, "the Gospel makes its way through the world."

So, take time to watch the trees grow this summer, confident that God is working to bring the harvest of the kingdom of God for all God's people. Come to St. John's Church. Invite a family member, neighbor or friend. *God bless, Father Ron*

WE ALL LOVE ST. JOHN'S CHURCH! It is our spiritual home. Since its incorporation in 1851, St. John's has played a crucial role in the Diocese of New Jersey and in the world. It is a place where men, women, and children are formed and informed for ministries, study, prayer, and common life in community, drawing from a rich variety of diversity and alive with the Good News of Jesus' death and Resurrection.

The Wardens, Vestry, Finance, and Stewardship Committees are all keenly aware of a \$45k shortfall in our budget and have been praying what to do. (You may recall there was a \$30k shortfall last year. By the end of last December, thanks be to God, we met our goal, thanks in part for our "2023 Bridge The Gap" efforts). St. John's is rising to the challenge in responding to our Baptismal Covenant in seeking, serving, proclaiming, believing that what we do here makes a difference in the lives of many people. We have faith that at the end of the day, all shall be well. But the cost of our common life continues to rise, expenses in



maintaining our buildings, and we are committed to seeing our beloved Church flourish without debt. Your faithful and generous support makes a difference! Therefore, we have kicked off a "Bridge The Gap Campaign for 2024."

Once again, we had the privilege of watching our Church School students grow in their faith this year. We count ourselves abundantly blessed to walk alongside the youth of our parish. Each student has a bright mind and an energetic soul. Each student reflects the love of Christ. We are grateful for the time and ministry of our teachers: Tracey Jameson, Michelle Hernandez and Taffy Scherr. We are grateful to

the parents of our students for their support, help and love. We give God thanks for the opportunity to educate and help form disciples of Jesus Christ through the ministry of church school formation.

ACOLYTES

On Sunday mornings we are humbled for the special ministry of those who serve as acolyte, crucifer or banner bearer. It is the well-ordered public worship that makes sure our liturgy dignified and spiritually uplifting as disciples of Christ and as a community of faith. We are so proud of our acolytes. Thank you to our core acolytes and for their supportive parents.

There was a little boy who one Sunday didn't want to go to church. "Church is okay, I guess," he said. "The priest says that all baptized Christians are invited to receive communion, which I think is really cool. But no one ever asks me to do anything." We, my brothers and sisters in Christ, have more to say than that. We have Church School students, acolytes, crucifers and banner bearers right in our very midst who we are called to join us in all kinds of ministries in this community of faith. Let that be our mission: that our faith always be followed by action, our corporate lives will compose a painting that reflects God, and that the students and acolytes we meet on Sunday will see more clearly that they too, are beloved, and welcomed, and asked to join in Christ's "call to action."

Come and join us on June 9 for Recognition/Awards Sunday following the 10:15 am Eucharist in the Parish Hall. There will be a light luncheon for students, their parents and teachers to celebrate their achievements and ministry.

Choral Evensong, Sunday, June 9

The Parish Choir will offer Choral Evensong on Sunday, June 11 at 5 pm, with music by Herbert Howells, William H. Harris, Harrison Oxley, Palestrina, more. A wine and cheese reception will follow.

Episcopalians celebrate services called "offices" at the beginning and the ending of the day. These daily services of prayer and praise are rooted in the Jewish and



early Christian traditions of saying prayers at fixed hours of the day (Acts 10:9, 16:25). Many cathedrals, monastic houses, and collegiate chapels throughout the





world celebrate these services daily, and choral Evensong is one of the most distinctive parts of the Episcopal/Anglican musical tradition. Settings of the *Magnificat* (The Song of Mary) and *Nunc dimittis* (The Song of Simeon) have formed the foundation of our choral tradition since the beginning of the Protestant Reformation. The pairing of these canticles at Evensong is meant to illustrate that God's promise and fulfillment of salvation are a never-ending circle, just as the regular celebration of Evensong is a liturgical conversation that was begun long before we were here and will continue long after we are gone.

So come and celebrate our wonderful Parish Choir on Sunday, June 9, and bring a friend or two! The offerings at the service will support our **Brent F. Miller Memorial Music Fund**. Everyone is welcome!


Meals to Go

Parish BBQ and 'Kitchen Mission'-Sunday, July 14

You are cordially invited to a Parish BBQ—and to hear about our 'Kitchen Mission! On Sunday, July 14, please join your fellow parishioners after the 10:15 am Eucharist for a special presentation by Somerville architect Dennis Kowal, in which he will lay out the plan for the proposed renovation of the big kitchen in the Parish Hall.

The renovation will bring the kitchen to a fully functional, energy efficient, and attractive state, allowing it to be used to prepare (not just heat up and set out) meals to support and expand our mission to the community, bring us together in service and for great parish events, and raise donations from private parties hosted in the Hall. The project will bring our kitchen up to the standards of Somerville's construction code (we've gotten a pass on that so far), and include an upgrade of electrical service necessary both to support a fully functioning kitchen, and future air conditioning of the entire Parish Hall—turning it into a yearround venue.



Immediately following the presentation, and a Q&A session (*please ask questions!*), Dan's Backyard Bar-B-Que will open at 12:30 pm, to serve "Mouthwatering Mains (pulled pork, hamburgers, hot dogs) and Scrumptious Sides (coleslaw, mac-n-cheese, cucumber / tomato / onion salad, corn bread,
