From the Rector

PEMEMBER A BEAUTIFUL WHITE BIRCH TREE in my parents' back yard in Cinnaminson, New Jersey. At the time we planted it I think I was just as tall as the tree was. The years passed, our family life went ahead and I didn't give it much thought. Day and night, year-in, year-out, the tree grew while we worked and played, and laughed and cried. My brother and sister and I grew up and had our pictures taken in the backyard on



special occasions: birthdays, confirmations, graduations, and so forth. And in the summer when we played baseball the tree was located in the perfect position to be "second base." As we had done for years, kids from the neighborhood would come by to play baseball, and drink lemonade by our favorite birch tree.

In many of His parables, Jesus points to natural growth—seeds, plants, crops, shrubs and trees—to illustrate the growth of the reign of God. In the parable of the seed growing secretly (Mark 4:26-29), our Lord teaches that a farmer "knows not how" seeds sprout and grow. "The earth produces of itself," while the farmer works and sleeps, day and night. "But when the grain is ripe, at once he goes in with his sickle, because the harvest has come." The growth of the kingdom of God is just as certain as that!

In baptism we are called to work and pray and give for the kingdom of God. But the kingdom is coming, because God is faithful. Martin Luther, who taught and preached and led the Reformation with his relentless energy, could also sit and rest, confident in God's faithfulness. "While I sit and drink my little glass of Wittenberg beer," he once said, "the Gospel makes its way through the world."

So, take time to watch the trees grow this summer, confident that God is working to bring the harvest of the kingdom of God for all God's people. Come to St. John's Church. Invite a family member, neighbor or friend.

ST. BARNABAS

The Church traditionally celebrates one of its founding Apostles, Barnabas, on June 11. Barnabas was a prodigious Apostle, the one who went to retrieve Saul (later Paul) who had been struck down by blindness on the Damascus Road, who nurtured Paul in the faith, who introduced him to a wary community of early believers among whom Paul had no standing. It was Barnabas who called Paul to be his assistant in Antioch, the place where the term Christian was first used for the followers of this new "Way" (Acts 11:26). Later, taking his nephew Mark, Barnabas would sail to Cyprus and there found the Church. The faith of Barnabas in Mark weas a strong factor in the development of the second Evangelist and the monumental work which bears his name. Luke writes that Barnabas was a "good man, full of the Holy Spirit and faith" (Acts 11:24). He undertook his ministry because it was something he loved doing, a way of giving tangible expression to the pleasure he derived from his relationship to God.

On Wednesday, June 11, St Barnabas' Feast Day, I will celebrate my thirty-first anniversary of ordination to the Diaconate. I give God thanks for the opportunity to serve Christ's Church here at St. John's, Somerville, in The Diocese of New Jersey.


A Prayer for Pride Month
