From the Rector

WHAT IS THE CHURCH FAMOUS FOR?

Not long ago a young couple was strolling along West High Street. They stopped, looked at the gardens and the architecture, and inquired what happens here. They asked, "What is this church famous for?" I went into my practiced "tourist-guide mode" and told them excitedly about our history, architecture, (including Horace Trumbauer the famous architect who built the church and rectory), worship, music, teaching and preaching. I told



them that we celebrate our 175 Anniversary this year. I invited them inside for a tour and they were thrilled to be invited inside. They were fascinated by the beautiful Tiffany windows, the old carriage entrance way, and many ornate appointments. They wondered what "Episcopal" meant. I tried to tell them as best I could. I am not sure if my answer made an impression on them, but their question certainly made an impression on me. It is the kind of question which makes me stop to think about the many reasons why this church is so deeply meaningful to me and countless others. It is a healthy question to reflect upon.

As reflected by Neva Rae Fox in a recent 175 Anniversary communication:

Organized in 1850 and incorporated in 1851, St. John's is located in the heart of Somerville, the county seat of Somerset County. The current church is the second house of worship constructed on the same site on West High Street.

Over the past 175 years, St John's has witnessed many names, faces, experienced much happiness as well as sadness, and seen as impressive parade of contributors and friends. Through all the years, there have been constants in the lives of the people of St. John's – a deep commitment to the work of our Lord, a strong faith and devotion to Jesus Christ, and an unblinding focus to our mission, "To Know Christ And To Make Him Known."

Our church stands to remind us there is more to our lives, more to life itself, than the things around which the life of this earthly Borough of Somerville and surrounding towns and cities are organized: the production of wealth, the marketing of products, the supplying of entertainment, the gratification of desires. Our church is a place of challenge and disturbance, holy ground on which we must take off our shoes and listen to the voice of God that calls us to go down into this world's Egypt and tell Pharaoh to let God's people go. Our church is a holy temple in whose worship we hear God's voice saying, "Who will go for us? Whom shall we

send?" This is a place where we find ourselves saying, "Here am I. Send me" (Isaiah 6:8ff). And the angel takes the burning coal from the altar fire and touches our lips so that we can speak the Word of God to men, women and children everywhere. Our church is about disciples and saints. This church, our parish, cannot function as an outpost of heaven without a community, a congregation. Our church is a community of believers dedicated to listening for the Word of God, willing however fearfully to answer God's call and do God's bidding. Our church is a community strengthened by the spiritual disciplines of worship, prayer, and music, study, mutual care, confession and Eucharist. Our church is a community of believers who see our calling from God, our individual and corporate vocation at this time, to be God's people in this place and for God's people. Our church is a community of workers, not consumers.

It seems to me that over the years while external and visible work of restoration with paint and nails, new slate roof, gutters and down-spouts has taken place, always wanting to care for the physical property bequeathed to us, there has also been an on-going inner and spiritual transformation in the life of this church that could easily have got stuck in the past or retreated into a world of make-believe and we are better for it. We will not squander it.

So one day, when the question "What is this church famous for?" is asked, I pray that someone will answer: "Because there I found a ladder set up between heaven and 158 West High Street and "the angels of God were ascending and descending upon it" (Genesis 28:12).

CONFIRMATION AND RECEPTION INTO THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH

Confirming our faith and receiving the sacred seal showing that we belong to God.

We are thrilled to have The Right Reverend J. Neil Alexander, IX Bishop of Atlanta, on Sunday, November 9. Bishop Alexander will preach at the 8am Eucharist. The Confirmation service will be at 10:15am where the Bishop will confer the sacrament of Confirmation, celebrate, preach.

There will be a special coffee hour following the 8am service as well as after the 10:15am service. You may especially want to invite a friend, neighbor or family member on that Sunday!

Confirmation ("strengthening") completes the initiation (entry) of Baptism, with prayer for the gift of the Holy Spirit who is poured out upon us, to fortify our faith and deepen our Christian commitment. The gift and grace of the Spirit swelling within us moves us from being simply Disciples, followers, of Christ, to being also Apostles of Christ, proclaiming His Good News and making it happen by sharing in His work. In this way Confirmation is a sacrament of ongoing conversion, and a sacrament of mature and adult faith.

For a period of time, both young people and adults will be preparing for Confirmation and/or preparing to be received into the Episcopal Church. Classes will begin in September. Further information is forthcoming. The community here at St. John's will be particularly supportive and excited for those who will be ready to be confirmed and/or received.

Why Be Confirmed?

Confirmation empowers and celebrates our adult faith. It strengthens our growth in Christ.

Confirmed Christians are enabled to take a more full and active part in the life of the Church.

It helps us deal more appropriately with the moral challenges we face in daily life. Our faith journey is toward God. "Let the hearts of those who seek the Lord rejoice" (Psalm 105:3).

Perhaps St. Augustine said it best: "You have made us for yourself, O Lord, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you" (Confessions, 1,1).

They may and should take part and minister at weekly Sunday worship in whatever role the Holy Spirit calls them to and their talents suit them for.

They can and ought to take an active part in the life of their parish and their community, again according to their talents and gifts: The outpouring of the Holy Spirit is the source and strength of their Christian life and vocation, in family or single life, in service and profession, in citizenship and civic responsibility, in social and in cultural life.

The community of faith has an important role to play:

During the Liturgy the Bishop will ask: "Will you who witness these vows do all in your power to support these persons in their life in Christ?" (BCP, page 416) Then

all are invited to renew their own baptismal vows in the proclamation of the Baptismal Covenant. (page 416-417)

Please do everything in your power to support and nurture our young people and adults as well who will be received into the Episcopal Church. Pray for them. Go out of your way to help them. Find ways to invite and incorporate them into the life of the Church.

I look forward to standing alongside all of those who will be Confirmed and/or Received on Sunday, November 9. I hope to see all of you in Church on that Sunday as well!

What to Expect When You Visit

Worship in the Episcopal Church

Sunday is traditionally when Episcopalians gather for worship. The principal weekly worship service is the Holy <u>Eucharist</u>, also known as the Lord's Supper, Holy <u>Communion</u>, or Mass. In most Episcopal churches, worship is accompanied by the singing of <u>liturgical</u>, meaning that the congregation follows service forms and prays from texts that don't change greatly from week to week during a <u>season of the year</u>. This sameness from week to week gives worship a rhythm that becomes comforting and familiar to the worshipers.

For the first-time visitor, liturgy may be exhilarating or confusing. Services may involve standing, sitting, kneeling, sung or spoken responses, and other participatory elements that may provide a challenge for the first-time visitor. However, liturgical worship can be compared with a dance: once you learn the steps, you come to appreciate the rhythm, and it becomes satisfying to dance, again and again, as the music changes.

The Holy Eucharist

In spite of the diversity of worship styles in the Episcopal Church, <u>Holy</u> <u>Eucharist</u> always has the same components and the same shape.

The Liturgy of the Word

We begin by praising God through song and prayer and then listen to as many as four readings from the <u>Bible</u>. Usually one from the <u>Old Testament</u>, a Psalm, something from the <u>Epistles</u>, and (always) a reading from the <u>Gospels</u>. The psalm is usually sung or recited by the congregation.

Next, a <u>sermon</u> interpreting the readings <u>appointed for the day</u> is preached.

The congregation then recites the Nicene <u>Creed</u>, written in the Fourth Century and the Church's statement of what we believe ever since.

Next, the congregation prays together for the Church, the World, and those in need. We pray for the sick, thank God for all the good things in our lives, and finally, we pray for the dead. The <u>presider</u> (e.g. priest, bishop, lay minister) concludes with a prayer that gathers the <u>petitions</u> into a communal offering of <u>intercession</u>.

In certain seasons of the Church year, the congregation formally <u>confesses</u> their <u>sins</u> before God and one another. This is a corporate statement of what we have done and what we have left undone, followed by a pronouncement of <u>absolution</u>. In pronouncing absolution, the presider assures the congregation that God is always ready to forgive our sins.

The congregation then greets one another with a sign of <u>peace</u>.

The Liturgy of the Table

Next, the priest stands at the table, which has been set with a cup of <u>wine</u> and a plate of bread or wafers, raises his or her hands, and greets the congregation again, saying The Lord be With You. Now begins the <u>Eucharistic Prayer</u>, in which the presider tells the story of our faith, from the beginning of Creation, through the choosing of Israel to be God's people, through our continual turning away from

God, and God's calling us to return. Finally, the presider tells the story of the coming of Jesus Christ, and about the night before his death, on which he instituted the Eucharistic meal (communion) as a continual remembrance of him.

The presider blesses the bread and wine, and the congregation recites the <u>Lord's Prayer</u>. Finally, the presider <u>breaks the bread</u> and offers it to the congregation, as the gifts of God for the People of God.

The congregation then shares the <u>consecrated</u> bread and the wine. Sometimes the people all come forward to receive the bread and wine; sometimes they pass the <u>elements</u> around in other ways.

All Are Welcome

All baptized Christians' no matter age or denomination are welcome to receive communion. Episcopalians invite all baptized people to receive, not because we take the Eucharist lightly, but because we take our <u>baptism</u> so seriously.

Visitors who are not baptized Christians are welcome to come forward during the Communion to receive a blessing from the presider.

At the end of the Eucharist, the congregation prays once more in thanksgiving and then is dismissed to continue the life of service to God and to the World.


